An introduction to course jargon

Major: A specialised area of study connected to your degree, with 8 inter-related units spread across your course

Co-major: A second specialised area of study, with 8 inter-related units from outside the arts, humanities, and social sciences study area

Minor: 4 inter-related units taken from a wide range of study areas from across Swinburne

Elective: Single units that don't form part of a major or minor

Flexible and modular

With a Swinburne arts degree, the only difficulty you might have launching a career is deciding which one. Career choices are innumerable, boasting transferable skills that integrate seamlessly across any community services or industry sector, from healthcare to finance to education to NGOs... you name it.

Hang one degree on your wall, or two. There's no need to choose between a private passion and something mum or dad might be happier with, as we offer a range of arts-based double degrees. Most are achievable in as little as four years so expand your university experience even further and prepare for optimal career choice in whichever direction life takes you.

After choosing your major, you'll still have half of your degree to make your own. You may opt to enhance your qualification with one of nearly 30 co-majors with subjects as diverse as animation, finance, neuroscience, and space technology; or explore the 50 or so minor options and almost endless list of electives. The modular nature of Swinburne's arts degree also makes it easy to add a study tour, second internship, professional placement, or international student exchange.
